Turf dilemmas

A fter a couple of calls this fall about our lawn program (specifically fertilizer applications in September), I thought it may be a good topic for this month — for plant health nerds anyway.



RANDY JAMES, consulting arborist / pathologist and founder of Growing Concerns Inc. Most important is to note that Kansas State University recommends an average fescue residential lawn receive at least 4 lbs. of nitrogen (N) per year/1,000 sq. ft., for adequate health and color.

This means if you were applying a 10-10-10 fertilizer on a

10,000-sq. ft. lawn, you would need to put down 100 lbs. of product to get one 1 lb. of N per 1,000 sq. feet. (10 lbs. N/100 lbs. of product x 1lb N/1,000 sq. ft. x 10,000 sq. ft.)

Following this line, if you then want 4 lbs. of N per year, you would need to make four applications per season. That is straight-forward enough, but the question is when those four applications are best applied, and there is the dilemma.

We have elected to apply quick release N on our first round along with the spring pre-emergent (Feb./ March), followed by a slow release form in May; another slow release in June/July and a final fast release source in November ("winterizer").

The rub is that some research recommends a September application of fertilizer. However, this

conflicts with our Sept./Oct. liquid broadleaf round that we have found provides the best weed control and least off-target damage for spring weeds.

So what is one to do? Weeds or color?

After nearly 20 years in business, we have concluded that our high grade sources of N have resulted in a negligible difference in color without the September application, but one weed, especially a dandelion, is enough to ruin an otherwise nice lawn; so weed control wins out in our book!
